According to documentation from Barton Wright, he estimates that Mrs. Mathilda Coxe Evans Stevenson collected this doll in 1886 (Smihsonian Number 113605) and may have been either deaccessed or sold to Victor J. Evans prior to the 1930s who then donated it to the Smithsonian in 1931 (361088).
